POST-PROGRAM TEACHING ACTIVITIES

INSTRUCTIONS

The following activies are designed to be used after viewing the <u>9/11 Anniversary Digital Learning</u>
<u>Experience</u>. They can be completed as a class or individually depending on your specific learning environment.

GRADES 3-5

Explore age-appropriate <u>lesson plans</u> and <u>art activites</u> focused on themes of memorialization and remembrance.

Activity: Dear Hero

GRADES 6-8

Ask students visit the Memorial Guide.

This resource includes photographs and biographical information about each of the 2,977 victims of the 9/11 attacks and the 6 victims of the 1993 World Trade Center bombing. Using the 'Find an Name on the Memorial' feature, encourage students to search by their state or hometown to learn more about victims that have a direct connection to their community.

As a class, brainstorm ways students can honor or pay tribute to the person or people they learned about.

GRADES 9-12

Explore the concepts of memorialization and remembrance using the lesson plan, <u>Architecture of Remembrance</u>, designed to challenge students to consider what it means to reflect on 9/11 in the years after the attacks.
